# **May 2022**

Wandering around out on the internet I found a most curious discussion taking place. I stumbled across a discussion as to whether or not a sermon should be focused on the lost and bringing them to Christ, or focused on teaching about Jesus Christ. I was dumbfounded; I would say neither.

From my perspective the sermon is an exposé on the Word of God, and what the Word of God is calling us to do in response to God's grace in our lives. A sermon may call us to accept Christ as our Lord and Savior, or it may call us to be involved in a Christian



Education class, but it is more likely to have us live as if God's love for us will never spoil or fade; to be a people with glad and sincere hearts bringing that to a needy world; to be a people that are a, "royal priesthood." Worship, the context in which we find a sermon, is a time to ascribe worth to God who has blessed us, called us and enjoys the people of God as they sing praise, offer prayers and earnestly open their lives, individually and corporately to God.

In our, "Book of Common Worship," the basic movements for the, "Service for the Lord's Day" are very simple: Gathering, The Word, The Sacraments (when observed) and Sending. I had learned it in seminary as, Preparation, Proclamation and Response with the sacraments after the proclamation. Within each of these general movements lie specifics we can do to prepare or proclaim or respond. Let's think about the preparation for worship and gathering first.

Worship really begins with sunrise on the first day of the week – Sunday, or as I like to think of it, Sonday. This is the day Christ set the world free from bondage to any and all plagues of life. It is the day God declared sin had lost its hold on mankind – our sin was buried on Friday and a new life was born on Sunday. Sunday at sunrise we can openly commit ourselves fresh and new to God's loving grace. We can begin preparing to worship God.

Preparation continues as we pause for personal prayer; prepare our bodies as fragrant offerings coming to God's holy sanctuary. (Remember how the women were going with fragrant offerings to prepare Christ for the day? – So we do the same.) We prepare our hearts as we see fellow members of Christ gathering with us. Some of these family members we like real well, others, well..., but we are the Body of Christ gathering and we open ourselves to the great differences and joys we have as that body.

We prepare with music that helps move us from a regular day to a holy (wholly other) day. We're called together by God, offering hymns of praise and prayers or litanies of invocation or confession that we might be set right by God for the activity of worship. God's Holy Spirit comes and we are blessed in our worship.

Come and receive the meaning of God's love for you. Worship in truth and life through Christ our Lord.

# KINGS GOSPEL MISSION

### **Deacons - Food Pantry**

Matthew 25:35,37,40 "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat and something to drink..., then the right-eous will answer him, Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? ...., the King will reply, I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

First Pres Hanford is blessed to have a loving & caring congregation who supports our food pantry. Currently, our food donations are given to the Kings Gospel Mission (KGM) a local Christian organization that shares the gospel with everyone involved. I was blessed to have a conversation with a person who cooks the dinner meals, she was very thankful for our monthly donation of food. I asked about their program and she shared they feed approximately a total of 100 men & women dinner, 4 nights a week and for 3 nights a week, 15 to 20 women. They also prepare about 20 to 25 boxes of individual items of food each week for individuals that board with them who need food over the weekend. I asked if they needed any specific items that would be helpful for them.

Here is a list of some of the non-perishable items they use on a weekly basis – large quantities from Costco or Smart & Final are helpful.

Tortillas

Spaghetti Sauce – large cans

Large bags of beans (bulk)

Large #10 size can of peaches or pears

Spaghetti – Dry

Rice – 10 pounds or more (bulk)

Large box of cornbread mix – serve 16

Cereal large bags

Individual items are still needed as well for the weekend boxes & these are just some of the items they use on a weekly basis.

Cold Cereal individual servings Oatmeal individual servings

Canned vegetables & fruit

Mac & Cheese

Chips & cookies individual servings

Crackers Soup

Peanut Butter & Jelly

Cake Mix & Icing

Ramen in a cup

Some medical supplies are needed & she suggested the dollar store for items such as band aids, Tylenol, aspirin, tums, & Pepto-Bismol.

KGM is providing food and shelter to those who are homeless & facing difficult situations such as drug or alcohol addiction, abuse, etc. First Pres is helping with that food ministry to feed the least of these.

Josh and Katya are servants called by our Lord Jesus, commissioned by the Evangelical Presbyterian Church, and sent out with love for Christ's global Church. Josh was born and raised in Colorado before moving to East Asia as a six-year-old missionary kid (MK) with World Outreach (WO). He knows firsthand and painfully well many common MK struggles which led to his feeling called by

God to minister to them. He went on to gain his B.S. in Scripture and Theology (minor in Christian Ministry) at LeTourneau University and continued serving in youth ministry in his home church for ten years. He has already served MKs through short-term trips with World Outreach and with his home church.

Katya was born to parents serving with the Alliance in Venezuela and grew up moving around the US and Canada. She was called to global work at age 14, and she completed her B.A. in International Relations from UC Davis while serving with InterVarsity Christian Fellowship. Local and overseas ministry experiences have led her to discerning the imperativeness of prayer and care ministries to supporting and fulfilling the Great Commission given to Christ's Church.

Josh and Katya both have experience living as missionary kids, and they know first-hand that as MKs are transplanted, it is typical for them to experience struggles with identity, belonging, loss, and grief. Statistics reflect that MKs are vulnerable and at high risk for experiencing trauma, mental illness, and suicide. Being there for these kids on the mission field makes space for discipleship, timely debriefing of difficult international transitions, and empowering parents to understand and help their children. Josh and Katya see MK care as a clear responsibility of the Church and believe that on-field help can prevent many years of ensuing heartache and confusion. Their desire is for MKs to thrive in faith and health and for workers' families to flourish and serve sustainably. Josh and Katya feel called to minister as the Body of Christ to those who serve where there is, as yet, no Body else.

As Regional MK Care Facilitators with Avant Ministries (and cooperatively sent by the EPC's World Outreach), Josh and Katya will be based in and serve from a strategic city in Western Europe. They will work with the MKs in their region and travel to serve at annual conferences throughout the world. Please keep Josh and Katya in prayer for God's guidance and for strength and protection as they move forward in their Mission serving the Lord!
















# Ffaith & Ellowship

**June 5** – Pops Concert in the Park at 7:30 in front of the Civic Auditorium.


