"Dealing with Disappointment" Pastor Tim Brown

"We must accept finite disappointment but never lose infinite hope." ~ Martin Luther King, Jr.

We all face disappointments in life. Perhaps your children break your heart by behaving in specific ways. Your spouse promises to love, honor, and cherish you 'til death do you part, but some days, your spouse loves a job, a hobby, or friends more than you. You think you have found the perfect church only to discover sometime later that there's no such thing as a perfect church and churches are led by flawed people. Jobs, finances, health, people, family, and relationships all have the power to disappoint us.

As disciples of Jesus, how should we deal with disappointment?

1. Shed some tears. It is ok to cry. In the 70s, a band called 10cc did a song entitled "I'm Not in Love." An eerie refrain at the end says, "Big boys don't cry. Big boys don't cry." That is not true.

God created us with emotions. To deny them is to deny our humanity. Jesus wept over the city that rejected Him. "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, who kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to her. How often I wanted to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing!" (Matt. 23:37).

Jesus experienced many of the same emotions we experience. Isaiah describes Him not as a distant God far removed from our pain but as a "man of sorrows and acquainted with grief" (Isa. 53:3). We can trust Him with our hurt.

2. Assess your expectations. I often discover I feel disappointed because I've set unrealistic expectations. I have often made a desire an expectation and set myself up for disappointment.

God's Word and His Spirit can help us evaluate whether our hopes are unrealistic or naïve. Invite Him to search your heart. Accept what He reveals. Then, ask Him to give you the desires He wants you to have.

3. *Be honest with God about your disappointments.* During some of the darkest times of my life, when I was disappointed with myself, others, or God, I found it hard to pray. Instead of running toward God, I ran away from Him.

When I bring my disappointments to God, I position myself to receive His comfort. In Psalm 42, he beautifully demonstrated how we can speak truth to our soul, even from the depths of our discouragement. Verse 5 says, "Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God."

4. Find comfort in God's promises. Here are some promises to remember. He will never leave us or forsake us (Deut. 31:6). He will be our advocate (1 John 2:1), our refuge (2 Sam. 22:3), and our strong tower (Prov. 18:10).

He will comfort and quiet us (Isaiah 51:12), surround us with His love (Psalm 33:22), and, one day, He will wipe all the tears from our eyes (Rev. 21:4).

5. Surrender your desires and trust Him. For me, this sounds something like this: "Lord, you know what I hoped would happen in this situation/relationship. As best I can tell, my desires honored you. But I don't know everything you know. I acknowledge that your ways are higher than my ways, and your thoughts higher than my thoughts (Isaiah 55:9). I also know you use the most unlikely means to accomplish the most beautiful ends. Help me trust you, for my good and your glory."

One day, Jesus will triumph over death, hell, and the grave. He will wipe the disappointed tears from our faces one last time and show us how "our momentary light affliction [produced] for us an absolutely incomparable eternal weight of glory" (2 Cor. 4:17).

Until then, disappointment will be part of our human experience. When we encounter it, it's okay to weep. With God's help, we can prayerfully examine our expectations, take comfort in God's promises, bring our desires to Him, and surrender to His will.

In our own strength, this is impossible, but with God's help we can do it. Each new disappointment brings another opportunity to trust Him. When we do, He comforts our hearts and grows our faith.

Remember the words of Jesus..."I have told you these things so that in me you may have peace. You will have suffering in this world. Be courageous! I have conquered the world" (John 16:33).







As we grow in our faith, through regularly participating in worship services, reading and studying the Bible, and serving others, we can understand more of who Jesus is and what God wants for us. Also, we know that our lives here on earth are not the end! We know how things will play out: God wins over evil and as believers in Christ, we will spend eternity in heaven with God who will one day return and put things right.

I love the first questions of the catechism that remind us: What is our only hope in life and death? That we are not our own but belong to God. How and why did God create us? God created us male and female in his own image to glorify him. How can we glorify God? By loving him and by obeying his commands and law. May we be inspired to faithfully attend and participate in worship, read and study God's Word and serve others! I hope you will continue learning and studying the New City Catechism (which is a great tool for learning and understanding scripture)! Remember to download the free app and learn the questions and answers to music as well!



Meet the Bakers

The distance from Columbus, Ohio, to the Bay Area, California, is approximately 2,500 miles. But in God's sovereignty and providence, He has a way of closing distances so His plans can be realized. Or, as in the words of the country band Rascal Flatts, "God blessed the broken road that led me straight to you." That's certainly part of the story for Bill and Julie Baker.

Bill grew up in Columbus, Ohio, and upon graduating from high school, he attended Miami University of Ohio and graduated with a BS in Marketing and Economics. Haley graduated from Hanford West, attended Biola University, and was an All-American Swimmer there. Upon graduation, she moved back east to work. She currently works and resides in Columbus, Ohio.

Both are Elders in our church, and Bill serves on Session as the Chair of Finance. Julie serves as the chair of our Deacons and is actively involved in serving the elderly in our church and community. They both assist FPC in finance.


